LSU AgCenter bridges the gap through community engagement


Supports walkability, safety, and inclusive planning



## Walk Audits in Action

- Walk audits are community-led assessments of walkability and safety.
- Involve local government, nonprofits, DOTD, and residents
- Tools: printed maps, clipboards, pens, safety vests, police support
- Low-cost and high-impact community engagement

### WHAT TO LOOK FOR:

#### School Zone

#### Are students walking or biking separated from car/bus drop

- Are there safe street/driveway crossings when approaching the school entrance?
- Are there continuous sidewalks/bike paths from approaches to school

- Are buildings well maintained
- · Are there vacant buildings?
- Are other people out and about?
- · Are there playgrounds or parks? Are parks safe and maintained?
